Signal from the Commodore.

It seems no time at all since I was writing the introduction to last Christmas's "Swarkestone Signal" and here we are again. I think we can look back over a successful year for the club, the 45th of its existence. There have been a number of really solid achievements of which we can all be proud, and there is much reason to look to the future with confidence.

Among many achievements, the most noticeable were the completion of the new pontoon and the replacement of 2 of the club coaching and patrol boats. On the people front, we have run formal training courses for Instructors, adults and juniors, with over 50 adults receiving RYA recognised qualifications from our training courses. The Juniors course in August again attracted over 30 participants. Within the club, I think without exception all the social events have been successful and well attended, and I think the Fireworks Night, with some 45 minutes of continuous firework display, was particularly outstanding.

This year, we set a target of trying to increase our membership by 10%, and I am delighted to be able to report that our membership actually increased by over 18%. In formal terms the membership at the end of September stood at

162 – but some of those members are actually family memberships, and if the dependent members are included as well, this represents a total membership of about 250.



Of course, during the year there have been some disappointments as well as all the really nice things that have happened. In particular, it is disappointing that members don't always turn up to do their duties – when this happens, it leaves the duty team short, and someone often has to step in, inconveniencing them and sometimes preventing them sailing. By the same token, it is a pity that relatively few members bear the brunt of running the tea bar, and disappointing that more members don't volunteer to take a share of this task. I would also add to my list of disappointments the number of boats in the boat park that don't seem to have been sailed in the last 12 months - I hope that in 2005 we shall see some of these on the water again.

In the immediate future we shall be starting the winter work parties in the New Year – even if you are not normally a D.I.Yer, do, please, try to come down for at least one or two Sunday morning sessions – it is your club, and its state of maintenance and preservation does depend on how much effort we can all put into this key task. As before, there is a prize draw (the more times you come, the more free tickets you get) and as before, entry into the Pete Wheatley race series is limited to those taking part in that day's work party.

Finally, don't forget our end of year social events – the Boxing Day bash (sailing, mulled wine and mince pies) and the New Year's Eve party. See you there!

Signal from the Vice Commodore regarding Club working days this winter

As usual there are a number of jobs that need doing to keep the club shipshape and we hope that as many of you as possible can come along on a Sunday morning and muck-in. The work party times are below but don't feel constrained by what boat you have – just turn up as often as you can.

The provisional job list is:

1. Repair plaster and paint far end of gents changing room (HP)
2. Replace bag rack taken down in gents changing room
3. Paint new door frame in gents and gloss paint door frame into gents loo.
4. Check-out wall fan heater in gents loo
5. Replace floor in bar/tea bar store with cushion floor or floor tiles.
6. Sort out teaching area – install shelf unit with storage for teaching aids, etc
7. Clean all strip light diffusers - strip light in gents loo needs replacing
8. Fill various holes in wall and touch up paint
9. Make shelf/box for Access electric control batteries at the end of bar, acquire double charger, and fit socket and timer.
10. Fit new two new UPVC fire exit double doors to clubhouse (KI)
11. Permanently secure coloured 'party lights' and wire in (MJR).
12. Complete concreting of access to new pontoon and build step to ramp
13. Paint new gate and post
14. Reinforce bank behind jetty using old tyres
15. Bring rescue boat jetty access bridge closer into shore or put in additional step
16. Erect barbed wire along perimeter public footpath.
17. Complete re-wiring of car park lamp post (DF)
18. Cut up and remove old trailers and other rubbish to Lount tip.
19. Improve the utility of the middle slipway for accessing east ('disabled') pontoon
20. Lay path (slabs?) to east end of disabled pontoon (8 m)

We are also looking in to extending the tarmac outside the front door and replacing the car park fencing but these require a greater capital outlay.

You will see that a few jobs already have initials beside them. If one or more of you fancy taking on a particular task, please let me know, either on the first Sunday or by phoning me at home – 01332 810275. As an incentive, all members who sign in by 10.00 am and stay to do jobs will be entered into a draw for a 12 bottle case of wine. The more times you turn up the more entries you will have! Useful items to bring: old clothes/overalls, gloves, tools/paintbrushes and sailing kit (in case you need to mess about in rescue boats for any job).

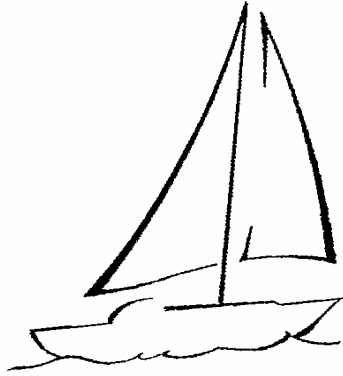
It was also good to see a large contingent of junior sailors. It was also the first time I've seen a queue for the disabled facilities!

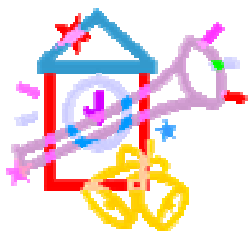
